*STATUS

NATIVE - A native plant is defined as either a plant that arrived naturally in Britain and Ireland since the end of the last glaciation (i.e., without the assistance of humans) or one that was already present (i.e., it persisted during the last Ice Age)

ALIEN – NON-NATIVE

Alien plants (i.e., those species that were introduced either deliberately or accidentally by humans) can be split into two categories, depending on when they arrived on these islands. They are either archaeophytes or neophytes.

Archaeophytes - Long-established aliens that were introduced by humans from the Neolithic era up to about AD1500. **Neophytes** - Aliens first introduced after the discovery of the New World in c.1550. This year marks a key turning point for our flora, because from that point onwards plant species were being imported into Britain and Ireland from across the globe for commercial and ornamental purposes.
